Pooled Money Investment Account Monthly Portfolio Composition (1) 07/31/20 \$113.5 billion







Hansen and E. Marie Hansen 1990 Trust and Cesar Flores)

BACKGROUND AND/OR HISTORY:

As part of the Oakdale Irrigation District's (OID's) recently completed Lane Pipeline and Consoli Pipeline Replacement and Pressurization Project, the existing Lane and Consoli pipelines within the parcels noted above were relocated outside of the existing almond orchard. To better accommodate the landowner's on-farm operations and OID's access through the parcels noted above, the landowners recently granted OID new easements through APNs: 064-027-003/004/017, recorded as Inst. No. 2019-38577 and Inst. No. 2019-38579. Please refer to the attached project site map for clarification. With the new easements fully executed and recorded and the new pipelines in place, OID staff recommends formally adopting the pipelines in their new alignments as OID facilities. The new pipeline ties into the existing pipeline approximately 15' south of where the OID Lane Pipeline crosses the southern boundary of Stanislaus County's Knox Road Right-of-Way. The new pipeline was installed generally within the center of the new easements from that point east, adjacent and parallel to the north property line in the northeast corner of APN: 064-027-003, continuing south generally on the shared property line of APNs: 064-027-003/004/017, continuing west adjacent and parallel to the south property line of APN: 064-027-004, and finally north adjacent and parallel to the west property line of APN: 064-027-004.

OID staff has also now determined that quitclaim of the existing 60 foot tax deed, Instrument No. 16131, dated October 20, 1944, for the Lane Pipeline and Consoli Pipeline on APNs: 064-027-002/003/004 will not be detrimental to the operations of OID. At the request of the landowner, OID staff recommends that the Board of Directors formally quitclaim said deed and abandon the old Lane and Consoli Pipelines in place within APNs: 064-027-002/003/004.



SUBJECT: REVIEW AND TAKE POSSIBLE ACTION TO MAKE SURFACE WATER AVAILABLE

IN OCTOBER 2020

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Staff Recommends Making Surface Water Available Until October 26,

2020 for Both OID and Local Out-of-District Lands

BACKGROUND AND/OR HISTORY:

The 2019/2020 water year will end at midnight on September 30th. All water delivered after September 30th will be charged to OID's 2021 water year usage under the 1988 Stipulation Agreement with the Bureau of Reclamation.

Water provided to OID customers in October however will be accounted (billed) for as part of their 2021 usage or allotment (if in place). This usage in October will have no impact in March 2021 should an allotment restriction be set.

With a full 300,000 acre foot water supply available this year, no allocation limitations were placed on Tier I or Tier II water. Although water was made available to local Ag growers outside OID boundaries only 4,500 acre feet was delivered as of August 25th. OID's diversions for 2019/20 are projected to finish off at around 248 TAF, inclusive of the 4,500 acre feet taken by local Ag growers outside OID boundaries. OID/SSJID's Conservation Account has not been firmed up yet by the Bureau of Reclamation but we anticipate some loss to Reclamation of the 52 TAF that went unused this year.

Given OID's investments and conservation efforts over the years to build-up its conserved water supplies, and the certainty in meeting next year's crop water demands at this point, there are a number of benefits to extending the irrigation season: First, a longer irrigation season affords more opportunity time for aquifers to benefit from recharge; second, post-harvest irrigation with surface water reduces landowner costs of pumping groundwater; and third; the ability to pre-irrigate for winter crops (oats) without relying on precipitation or groundwater pumping is also beneficial.

Because of these benefits staff recommends starting the 2020/2021 water year and making water available until October 26th. With concurrence from the Board, the final determination of when to pull the water will be made by staff dictated by water demand and/or precipitation.

While highly unlikely, if an allocation was to be imposed for either Tier I or Tier II water users in 2021, water used in October 2020 would not be deducted from that 2021 allotment. With concurrence from the Board, staff will also be prepared to start the 2021 irrigation season on or about the first of March or when practical based on precipitation.

FISCAL IMPACT: The construction season will be compressed thereby incurring more overtime to perform the amount of work done.

Flow demand fluctuations have increased which has made it more difficult to efficiently meet downstream demand while mitigating spill in two separate divisions, accounting for numerous points of drainage and reclamation inflow, and maintaining consistent upstream pool levels for steady flow rates to farmers' turnouts. Given the complexities of the system, OID proposes to replace and automate the Riverbank-Crane Diversion Structure (Project). The Project includes removal and replacement of the existing structure with a new structure equipped with two Rubicon FlumeGates, a Rubicon FlumeMeter installed on a replaced turnout, and conversion of approximately 420 feet of open ditch to pipeline.

This Project is categorically exempt from CEQA pursuant to Section 15302 Class 2 (c) - replacement or reconstruction of existing utility systems and/or facilities involving negligible or no expansion of capacity. The Project consists of the replacement of existing public facilities used for the conveyance of irrigation surface water and will result in negligible or no expansion of capacity.

Project Description:

The Oakdale Irrigation District (OID) Riverbank-Crane Diversion Structure Replacements Project (Project) proposes to remove and replace the existing structure with a new structure equipped with automated overshot gates capable of managing a dynamic irrigation flow demand. As part of this Project, approximately 420 linear feet of open ditch (portions of Riverbank and Crane Laterals) is proposed to be converted to a dual pipeline system comprised of approximately 349 linear feet of 72" concrete pipeline and approximately 371 linear feet of 60" concrete pipeline. In addition, this Project will include the removal and replacement of a Riverbank Lateral turnout with a new precast turnout structure equipped with a slide gate, stilling well assembly, an ultrasonic flow measurement device, and approximately 60 linear feet of 18" PVC pipeline. RECOMMENDED ACTION: Approve Recommended Fund Transfers to Designated Reserves to

Adhere to the Policy Adopted October 8, 2019

BACKGROUND AND/OR HISTORY:

Oakdale Irrigation District has developed a reserve policy, in accordance with direction from and best practices of both the California Special Districts Association (CSDA) and the Government Finance Officers' Association (GFOA), that considers the level of reserves necessary to adequately provide for:

- Cash flow requirements.
- Funding to meet the District's short-term and long-term plans as they relate to operations and capital improvements.
- Loss of significant revenue sources such as wholesale power income and property tax receipts due to local disasters or catastrophic events.
- Economic uncertainties, financial hardships, or downturns in the local or state economy.
- Credit worthiness.

Action(s) to be taken:

Unfunded mandates including costly regulatory requirements and other legal requirements.

In adherence to the adopted policy, the attached Cash Position Trend presents the recommended transfer of \$15.465M from undesignated funds to Designated Reserves. The policy sets a target of undesignated General Fund cash balances to be held at 40%-50% of annual revenue. After transfer, the year-end undesignated cash balance is projected at 49%.

SJTA Monthly Meeting: August 5, 2020

On August 5, 2020, the SJTA held a monthly meeting to discuss budget, administration, and pending cases/issues. Below is a summary of the meeting.

1. Budget: Michael Clipper presented the SJTA Year-to-Date Budget.

2. SJTA Invoices: Invoices for July 2020 consisted of O'Laughlin & Paris's attorney fees and consultant fees. Payment of all invoices was approved by a unanimous vote of the managers.

3. WQCP/SED - Coordinated Bay-Delta Litigation:

State Court Litigation

The State Water Board is still preparing the administrative record in the Coordinated Bay-Delta litigation. The Board filed a motion for a protective order in response to Merced ID's discovery request, and the SJTA submitted a response to the Board's motion. Separately, the Board also filed a motion to clarify the administrative record, asking the court to weigh in on the application of certain relevant CEQA provisions and the required contents of the record. A hearing on the protective order and motion to clarify the record were to be held on July 31, along with a case management conference, but the hearings were taken off calendar by the court and only the CMC was held. At the CMC, the judge stated the parties must file a request with the court before seeking discovery from the Board, and took under submission other arguments regarding the timing for filing discovery motions and motions to augment the record. The water user petitioners sent the Board a meet and confer letter regarding new case law pertaining to CEQA discovery and the contents of the record. Our office will keep this group apprised of developments as they arise. The next step will be the Board's lodging of the record with the court, for which there is no specific deadline.

Phase 2 of the WQCP

The Board has continued to indicate that a draft SED and proposed revisions to the WQCP will be released by the end of the year.



4. BiOps/ITP:

OID and SSJID have now intervened by stipulation in the BiOp lawsuits commenced by the State and the NGOs.

On June 2, the Federal Defendants moved to dismiss the State's cause of action which alleged that the Federal Defendants failed to comply with the California Endangered Species Act (CESA), asserting that requiring the federal government to comply with CESA would violate the rules of federal supremacy. The State has since filed an opposition to the motion, the NGOs have filed an amicus brief on the matter, and the Bureau has responded, so briefing is complete but a hearing will not be held on the matter unless the court specifically schedules one.

Eight cases have been filed in various state courts concerning DWR's issuance of an Incidental Take Permit for operation of the State Water Project. Petitioners include Metropolitan Water District, State Water Contractors, San Luis and Delta Mendota Water Authority, a number of other water users, and several NGO groups. A petition for coordination has been filed and no parties oppose coordination, so the only remaining issue is which court (Fresno or Sacramento) will hear the cases. Remy Moose Manley have been retained by DWR to assist in representing DWR.

- 5. Voluntary Agreements: On February 4, 2020, the State announced its new comprehensive framework for the VAs, including flows, habitat, and funding that would be "adequate" to submit to the SWB for consideration. Given the other pending matters like the BO lawsuits and recently-issued ITP, the VAs are effectively on hold. It does not appear that there will be continued substantive discussions until some of the other pending matters which might affect the VAs are resolved or clarified, such as the BO suits and possibly the November election. The State is, publicly, still "behind" the VAs, and there have been recent meetings to discuss a VA that would include the Tuolumne, Mokelumne, and Yuba Rivers. That VA could act as a "test case" for the viability of other VAs. Yuba and Tuolumne have now put out "principles" documents in response to the state's framework document, but negotiations have stalled.
- **6.** Wetlands Regulatory Proceedings and Complaint: The new Wetlands Procedures took effect on May 28, 2020. The SJTA has filed a petition and complaint challenging the Procedures on the grounds that the SWB exceeded its authority in adopting them.

The Stanford Law School environmental clinic filed a motion to intervene in the case on behalf of five non-governmental organizations. The court heard the intervention motion on June 9th and issued a ruling denying intervention, although it is allowing the group to file an amicus brief.

The SWB will finalize the administrative record for the case on August 24, and a hearing on the merits is set for December 4, 2020.



- 7. Curtailment Litigation and SWB Future Drought Planning: The curtailment matter is now on appeal; the SWB has appealed the Court's decision on the merits and the water users have appealed the Court's denial of their respective motions for attorneys' fees. Briefing will begin once the trial court compiles the record on appeal and sends it to the appellate court.
 - Our office has begun drafting an opening brief on the attorneys' fees issue, and will share those drafts with the SJTA after the trial court record is sent to the appellate court and we have a better idea on dates for the appeal process. There is still no timeline for when the trial court will provide the record to the appellate court; the appellate court has reached out for information but received no response, likely due to a COVID-related backlog in the trial court. We will continue to stay apprised of developments and report to the SJTA accordingly.
- 8. CV Salts: The SWB voted to approve the CV-SALTS program on October 16, 2019, and OAL approved the program (as a change to the existing WQCP) on January 15, 2020. O'Laughlin & Paris sent an email detailing the adoption of the program and changes made by the Board on October 24, 2019. The salt and nitrate programs will now begin rolling out in "waves." according to the status of the groundwater basins covered by the program. The Central Valley Regional Board began sending out compliance notices for the nitrate portion of the program in late May, which triggered a 270-day window to submit management zone proposals, or a one-year window to submit an individual plan, for those entities in the first "wave" of basins receiving notices. As a reminder, the Modesto and Turlock subbasins were included in the first wave of notices to comply, and the Eastern San Joaquin subbasin will be in the second wave. Compliance notices for the salt portion of the program will likely begin rolling out in August of this year. The Board is also already considering amendments to the relevant Water Quality Control Plan to remove the assimilative capacity discussion and add requirements for applying for nitrate offsets; our office will send out a summary of those changes to the WQCP soon. In March, this group's managers unanimously agreed to approve a payment of \$18,500 to continue to have an SJTA representative on the CV-SALTS committee currently conducting a long-term study on salts and nitrates, and the SJTA's rep attended the May commission meeting. Brandon Nakagawa will be the point person for this group. The affected parties have floated the idea of a Memorandum of Understanding to coordinate the monitoring and management zone approach, so we will keep the SJTA apprised of updates on that front.
- 9. Delta Stewardship Council Cases: In May 2016, the Sacramento Superior Court decided a set of consolidated actions challenging the Delta Stewardship Council's (DSC) actions in implementing the Delta Plan pursuant to the Delta Reform Act. The superior court issued a writ directing DSC to revise the Delta Plan and its regulatory policies, but on appeal the court was overturned and all the findings that favored the water user petitioners were overturned. On June 22, 2020, Metropolitan, SLDMWA, Westlands, State Water Contractors, Alameda County Flood Control and Water Conservation District, San Bernardino Valley Municipal Water District, Antelope Valley-East Kern Water Agency, Santa Clara Valley Water District, and Mojave Water Agency jointly filed a petition for review with the California Supreme





Court, raising two main questions: (1) does the Delta Reform Act give the Council authority to enact enforceable regulations addressing significant and controversial policy questions even if only tangentially related to the "coequal goals" of the Act, and (2) does the Act give the Council overlapping jurisdiction with the State Water Board over water rights of projects in the Delta? Metropolitan has since reached out to inquire whether the SJTA would consider submitting an amicus letter supporting their petition for review. Our office planned to draft an amicus letter concerning the narrow issue of the SJTA's interest in curtailing DSC's authority to adopt regulations, but the Supreme Court denied review shortly after the SJTA meeting, rendering the issue moot.

- 10. Drought Planning: Erik Ekdahl recently reached out to Valerie Kincaid to confirm the Board is in the early stages of putting together a "drought plan," given the contentious and ultimately failed efforts by the Board to conduct curtailment proceedings in 2015. This seems to be a positive first step in allowing water users to have input into drought planning processes; a meeting is planned for August to develop a group interested in this effort, and we will keep the SJTA updated.
- 11. Stanford Vina Amicus: Stanford Vina has petitioned the California Supreme Court for review of the appellate court's decision upholding the Board's authority to adopt minimum stream flow requirements under the waste and unreasonable use doctrine. The SJTA managers and commissioners have approved filing a letter in support of the petition for review. The letter was filed shortly after the SJTA's meeting.
- 12. Abatti vs. Imperial Irrigation District: On July 16, the Fourth District Court of Appeals issued an opinion in the case, in which the SJTA filed an amicus brief in support of IID. In short, the ruling was favorable for the SJTA's member agencies, as it affirmed that farmers within a district can possess an appurtenant beneficial interest in a right to water service, but not to the underlying water right itself. Relatedly, farmers are not automatically entitled to receive the amounts of water they have historically used to irrigate their crops. Abatti petitioned the court for rehearing, but rehearing has been denied. As part of the denial, the court slightly modified some of the language in the opinion, but the modifications reflected only a clarification from Abatti that the farmers were asserting an interest in the *District's* water rights, rather than legal title to their own pre-1914 rights the modifications do not impact the favorable result. If Abatti appeals to the Supreme Court, we will let this group know.
- 13. 401 Water Quality Certification Federal Rule: On June 1, the EPA issued the final rule for changes to the 401 water quality certification program. Our office sent a memo to the SJTA summarizing the final rule on June 26. The rule codifies the *Hoopa Valley Tribe* Supreme Court decision, making it unlawful to extend the one-year period for a certifying authority to grant, grant with conditions, or deny a 401 certification by asking an applicant to withdraw and resubmit its application. The rule also attempts to clarify the scope of what conditions a state may impose as conditions in a 401 certification; however, the rule leaves open the issue of whether an unimpaired flow condition in particular is appropriate, indicating that will be a



"case by case" determination for certifying agencies. The rule was published in the Federal Register on July 13, 2020, and will take effect 60 days from that date. Two lawsuits against the EPA have been filed, one by a coalition of states including California and the SWB, and one by a group of NGOs. These cases are in the very early stages, and we will keep the SJTA apprised of relevant updates.

REQUEST FOR DEPUBLICATION OF OPINION Cal. Rules of Court, Rules 8.1125(a), 8.1105(e)(2)

To the Chief Justice and Associate Justices:

The San Joaquin Tributaries Authority ("SJTA") previously submitted an amicus letter in support of Stanford Vina Ranch Irrigation Company's ("Stanford Vina Ranch") petition for review of *Stanford Vina Ranch Irrigation Company v. State of California, et al.* (2020) 50 Cal. App. 5th 976 ("*Stanford Vina*"). In the event this Court denies that petition for review, SJTA respectfully requests that this Court depublish *Stanford Vina* pursuant to California Rules of Court, Rules 8.1105(e)(2) and 8.1125(a).

SJTA's Interest in the Matter

The SJTA is a Joint Powers Authority comprised of public water agencies whose members include the City and County of San Francisco, Turlock Irrigation District, Modesto Irrigation District, Oakdale Irrigation District, and South San Joaquin Irrigation District. Collectively, SJTA's members provide drinking water to nearly 3 million Californians, and irrigation water for nearly 380,000 acres (594 sq. mi.) of the state's most prime, productive farmland. The SJTA's members hold water rights on the Tuolumne and Stanislaus Rivers and various tributaries thereto. All SJTA members share a common interest in protecting their water rights and defending against unlawful regulations that threaten their water reliability and operations.

In 2018, the State Water Resources Control Board ("State Water Board") adopted revisions to its Bay-Delta Plan requiring, among other things, that certain minimum flows be maintained on the Stanislaus and Tuolumne Rivers for the ostensible protection of fish and wildlife beneficial uses of water. The Board's adoption of the revised Bay-Delta Plan is currently being challenged by the SJTA, the United States of America, various public agencies throughout the state, and several nongovernmental organizations. As an agency whose members stand to be impacted by implementation of the flow requirements in the Bay-Delta Plan, the SJTA has an interest in whether the Board has authority to implement flow requirements through generally applicable regulations or whether it is required to hold water right hearings, the method by which it has historically implemented prior iterations of the Bay-Delta Plan.

Depublication Standard

The Supreme Court may order that an opinion certified for publication is not to be published. (Cal. Rules of Court ("CRC"), Rule 8.1105(e)(2).) "Any person may request the Supreme Court to order that an opinion certified for publication not be published." (CRC 8.1125(a)(1).)

An opinion should be depublished where: "(1) the opinion does not meet the publication criteria of Cal Rules of Ct 8.1105(c); (2) the opinion, even if correct in result, contains misleading or incorrect language that might cause confusion; or (3) the opinion is incorrect or unnecessarily creates a conflict. . . ." (Cal. Civil Appellate Practice (Cont. Ed. Bar. 3d ed. 1996) Publication and Citing of Opinions, § 21.17.)

Depublication is proper when an opinion is wrong in significant part, either in reasoning or result, or its analysis is too broad and can lead to unanticipated misuse as precedent. (*People v. Dee* (1990) 22 Cal.App.3d 760, 764; Eisenberg et al., Cal. Practice Guide: Civil Appeals and Writs (The Rutter Group 2018) ¶ 11:180.1, p. 11-75.) Both are applicable here.

The Stanford Vina Decision Should be Depublished Because it Fails to Properly Limit its Analysis to the State Water Board's Exercise of Emergency Rulemaking Authority During an Unprecedented Drought, Creating a Risk of Misuse as Precedent in Times of Non-Emergency

In 2014-2015, California was experiencing an unprecedented statewide drought. In response, the Governor issued a state of emergency which, among other things, directed the State Water Board to adopt emergency regulations pursuant to Water Code section 1058.5 as necessary to prevent the waste and unreasonable use of water. Based on this

limited authority, the State Water Board adopted two emergency regulations establishing minimum instream flows on Deer Creek, a tributary to the Sacramento River. The stated purpose of the emergency regulations was to protect endangered salmon that sometimes inhabit Deer Creek. (See Cal. Code Regs., tit. 23, former § 877(a); *Stanford Vina*, 50 Cal. App. 5th at 991 [noting suspension of one curtailment order "due to the absence of [species of concern] in Deer Creek"].) The emergency regulations provided that *any* diversions from Deer Creek "that would cause or threaten to cause flows" to fall below minimum flow levels established by the State Water Board constituted an unreasonable use of water. Thereafter, the State Water Board issued four separate curtailment orders pursuant to the emergency regulations directing all water right holders on Deer Creek to cease diverting water in 2014 and 2015. (*Stanford Vina*, 50 Cal. App. 5th at 991.) Thus, with the stroke of its emergency pen, the State Water Board established that the *only* reasonable use of the water in Deer Creek in 2014 and 2015 was for the fish species of concern, and all other uses of Deer Creek's water, including agricultural, municipal, and every other previously reasonable use of the water, were instantly unreasonable, a waste, and prohibited.

The decision in Stanford Vina is generally mindful of the exigency and uniqueness of the circumstances giving rise to the State Water Board's issuance of the emergency regulations. It acknowledges the "Drought Emergency" that led the Legislature to amend Water Code section 1058.5 to provide the State Water Board with certain authority upon the Governor's proclamation of a state of emergency, and it acknowledges that the State Water Board purported to rely upon that statute to establish the emergency regulations in dispute. (Stanford Vina, 50 Cal. App. 5th at 987-92.) However, the Court of Appeal fails to limit its analysis to the unique facts and circumstances of the case. To the contrary, Stanford Vina analyzes and concludes that the State Water Board's emergency regulations were "within the Board's regulatory authority" as established by Water Code section 275 and Article X, Section 2 of the California Constitution. (Id. at 1002.) The applicability of Water Code section 1058.5 and the exigency of the circumstances were afterthoughts to this conclusion and lacked meaningful and necessary analysis. (Id. at 1003 ["Moreover, the challenged regulations were not ordinary regulations, but were emergency regulations adopted pursuant to the specific statutory authority set forth in section 1058.5, in response to an 'unprecedented' drought emergency, requiring 'urgent' legislative and administrative action"].)

By framing its analysis in this manner, *Stanford Vina* creates risk that readers of the case will conclude that the State Water Board's authority to adopt emergency regulations establishing minimum stream flows is not derived from Water Code section 1058.5, or limited by the exigency of the circumstances present in the 2014 and 2015, but instead

arises from the Board's non-emergency powers and Article X, Section 2 of the California Constitution generally. This in turn threatens to remove any distinction between "regular" and "emergency" State Water Board regulations, and creates risk that "emergency" regulations like those challenged in *Stanford Vina* may be adopted and upheld even in times of non-emergency. This Court should eliminate any such confusion by restricting the *Stanford Vina* decision to its facts through depublication.

Stanford Vina Should be Depublished Because the Decision is Wrong in Significant Part and Threatens to Undermine Fundamental Principles of Due Process

This Court has consistently held that "[w]hat constitutes reasonable water use is dependent upon not only the entire circumstances presented but varies as the current situation changes." (EDF v. E. Bay Mun. Util. Dist. (1980) 26 Cal.3d 183, 194; see Joslin, supra, 67 Cal.2d at 139 ["reasonable use . . . is a question of fact to be determined according to the circumstances in each particular case"]; Tulare Irrigation Dist. v. Lindsay-Strathmore Irrigation Dist. (1935) 3 Cal.2d 489, 567 ["What may be a reasonable beneficial use, where water is present in excess of all needs, would not be a reasonable beneficial use in an area of great scarcity and great need"]; Gin S. Chow v. Santa Barbara (1933) 217 Cal. 673, 706 ["what is a reasonable or unreasonable use of water is a judicial question to be determined in the first instance by the trial court"]; Joerger v. Pacific Gas & Electric Co. (1929) 207 Cal. 8, 23 [reasonableness depends on "the custom of the locality"].) These holdings are consistent with the Legislature's "established policy" that reasonableness determinations are fact based. (Water Code § 100.5.) When determining the reasonableness of a particular use, the adjudicating body must consider "competing claims to the use of the water." (Joslin, supra, 67 Cal.2d at 142.)

The Stanford Vina decision disposes of this long-established principle, asserting that it only applies "in the absence of a per se rule of unreasonableness," such as the State Water Board's challenged regulation requiring minimum stream flows. (Stanford Vina Ranch Irrigation Co. v. State of California (2020) 50 Cal.App.5th 976, 1003-1004.) There is nothing in this Court's jurisprudence suggesting that the State Water Board can use its quasi-legislative authority to subvert the basic principle that reasonable water use determinations vary with changing circumstances and must consider competing claims to the use of water. The State Water Board should not be permitted to dispense with the necessary consideration of ever-changing circumstances and competing claims to water by issuing blanket regulations that deem certain uses of water – or any and all uses of water – to be unreasonable per se.

By allowing the State Water Board to use its quasi-legislative authority to deem all diversions of water to be *per se* unreasonable, the *Stanford Vina* decision permits the Board to deprive water right holders of the use of their property without due process protections, such as an evidentiary hearing in which competing claims to the use of water are considered. The State Water Board cannot be empowered to deprive water right holders of their constitutional right to due process in exchange for regulatory convenience, particularly where such regulations conflict with the well-reasoned precedent of this Court that reasonable use is a question of fact to be determined according to the circumstances in each particular case. As the *Stanford Vina* decision conflicts with this Court's precedent, it should be depublished.

Conclusion

For these reasons, SJTA respectfully requests that *Stanford Vina* be ordered depublished if Stanford Vina Ranch's pending petition for review is not granted.

Dear Chief Justice Cantil-Sakauye and Associate Justices:

Pursuant to Rules 8.500(g) and 8.1125(a) of the California Rules of Court, Amici Curiae Association of California Water Agencies, Northern California Water Association, Sacramento River Settlement Contractors, San Joaquin River Exchange Contractors Water Authority, San Luis & Delta-Mendota Water Authority, State Water Contractors, Tehama Colusa Canal Authority, Byron Bethany Irrigation District, Central California Irrigation District, City of Ukiah, Contra Costa Water District, East Bay Municipal Utility District, El Dorado Irrigation District, Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, Placer County Water Agency, and Westlands

Water District (collectively, "Amici") respectfully submit this letter in support of Petitioner Stanford Vina Ranch Irrigation Company's Petition for Review of the Court of Appeal's opinion in *Stanford Vina Ranch Irrigation Co. v. State of California, et al.* (2020) 50 Cal.App.5th 976 (the "Opinion").¹

Water rights are vested, constitutionally protected property rights. As such, California courts have long held that each holder of a water right must be afforded due process before the State Water Resources Control Board ("State Board") can adversely affect the exercise of that right. Here, the State Board circumvented these constitutional protections under the guise of an emergency rulemaking. The Court of Appeal said that is acceptable. It is not. The Court of Appeal erred by ignoring longstanding precedent, and if the decision is left to stand, it would allow the State Board to abuse its emergency regulatory powers to unlawfully infringe upon constitutional rights and undermine the water rights system that is a foundation of water planning statewide. This Court should grant review of the Court of Appeal's decision in order to protect fundamental constitutional rights to due process.

I. Interest of Amici Curiae

Amici are a diverse coalition of water associations and public water agencies engaged in municipal, agricultural, and wildlife refuge water supply service throughout California. Collectively, Amici and their association members are responsible for more than 90% of the water delivered to cities, farms, and businesses in California. In addition, these agencies include wildlife refuges that provide water for fish and wildlife uses across the state. Amici depend upon the consistent application of longstanding water rights principles, and on the procedural protections that have historically been applied in adjudicatory proceedings before the State Board and the courts, to ensure that the vast majority of Californians and California businesses have the water they need to survive and thrive.

The Amici support the petition for review and ask the State's highest court to protect the constitutional guarantee of due process with respect to California water rights. The State Board's actions at issue in this case undermine the basic foundation of water management and water service in California, by effectively taking water rights without due process. Indeed, the State Board's curtailment of water rights without affording adequate due process not only violates state and federal constitutional requirements, it also instills uncertainty in a water system that depends on reasonably stable expectations, especially under drought conditions.

As explained more fully below, the Appellate Court's Opinion fails to properly analyze the scope of the State Board's quasi-legislative authority and contravenes long-settled legal rules regarding the protections accorded water right holders and administration of water rights. In doing so, the Opinion creates instability and uncertainty for Amici, their rights, and the rights exercised to benefit them and those they serve.

II. The Case Arises in a Unique Factual Setting in a Small Stream System in Northern California Amidst a Statewide Drought.

Recurring droughts are a fact of life in California. California's most recent drought, which started in 2012 and continued through 2015, impacted every corner of the state, from the forests of the Sierra Nevada to river flows in the Sacramento Valley and home landscapes in every county. To address this statewide problem, the Legislature amended Water Code section 1058.5 to permit the State Board to adopt emergency regulations to prevent the unreasonable use of water. Pursuant to this amendment, the State Board, the state agency charged with protection of the public interest in the development of the State's water, twice adopted "emergency" regulations establishing minimum instream flows on Deer Creek, a small stream in rural northern California that ultimately flows to the Sacramento River, through the San Joaquin-Sacramento River Delta, and into the San Francisco Bay before draining to the ocean. The regulations provided that diversions from Deer Creek "that would cause or threaten to cause flows" to fall beneath minimum flow levels established by the State Board constituted a waste and unreasonable use of water under Article X, section 2 of the California Constitution. (Cal. Code Regs., tit. 23, former § 877.) The stated purpose of the emergency regulations was not to address the impacts and causes of the drought statewide, but rather to protect endangered salmon that sometimes inhabit Deer Creek. (See Cal. Code Regs., tit. 23, former § 877(a); Op. at 13 [observing that one curtailment order was suspended "due to the absence of [species of concern] in Deer Creek."].)

During the administrative process, the State Board acknowledged that it would be preferable to undertake "adjudicative water right proceedings" to assign responsibility for minimum instream flows (AR008442, ¶18). Nonetheless, the State Board styled its emergency regulations and related enforcement actions as quasi-legislative in nature to avoid compliance with what it characterized as "cumbersome" constitutional due process requirements. (AR008253 p. 27:11-28:6; 008255 p. 33:10-14; 008265 p. 74:11-14; 007815; 008249 p. 11:25-12:3.) The State Board subsequently issued four separate curtailment orders pursuant to the emergency regulations, directing all water right holders on Deer Creek to cease diverting water in 2014 and 2015. (Op. at pp. 10-13.)

Petitioner Stanford Vina filed the underlying civil action in October 2014. The operative complaint alleged that the State Board's adoption of the emergency regulations and issuance of the curtailment orders violated Stanford Vina's constitutional rights to due process and constituted a taking of private property triggering the constitutional requirement of just compensation. This amicus letter focuses on Stanford Vina's due process claims. With respect to those claims, Stanford Vina asserted that the State Board was required under state and federal law to hold an evidentiary hearing before it could adopt and enforce the emergency regulations.

In the trial court, the State Board argued that Stanford Vina was not deprived of due process because the emergency regulations themselves determined that Stanford Vina lacked a constitutionally protected interest in diverting water from Deer Creek. The trial court was understandably troubled by the circularity of this argument: "There is a 'chicken and egg' problem because it is the Water Board's actions, challenged in this case, which ostensibly established Stanford Vina's use was unreasonable and contrary to the public trust." (AR 1758.) Despite its stated reservations, the trial court determined that Stanford Vina was not entitled to the level of due process of law that is required in a quasi-adjudicatory proceeding and that should be accorded to a water right holder because the State Board's adoption of the emergency regulations was

"quasi-legislative" in nature. The Court of Appeal upheld this determination. (Op. at 15, 20.) Stanford Vina's Petition for Review was filed on July 21, 2020, and is now pending before this Court.

- III. The Petition for Review Should Be Granted to Ensure Due Process is Afforded by Administrative Decisionmakers when Threatening to Impact Vested Rights.
 - A. Review Is Necessary to Settle an Important Question of Law and Secure Uniformity of Decision.

Rule 8.500(b)(1) of the California Rules of Court provides that the Supreme Court may order review of a Court of Appeal decision "[w]hen necessary to secure uniformity of decision or to settle an important question of law." The Court of Appeal's Opinion upended longstanding rules governing the procedural rights in administrative proceedings that involve modifying existing water rights. While the unique facts in this case concern a rural and remote area during a severe drought, the Opinion has broad implications for the future administration of water rights—and other types of real property rights—throughout the state. In addition to the need for this Court to address this important legal issue, review is also necessary to ensure that courts engage in the functional analysis that has long been held necessary to determine whether administrative actions are properly classified as legislative or judicial.

B. The Court of Appeal Failed to Undertake the Functional Analysis Required Under Existing Law to Determine Whether the State Board's Action was Legislative or Judicial in Nature.

Stanford Vina manages its landowners' asserted senior riparian and pre-1914 appropriative water rights to divert and beneficially use water from Deer Creek. (AR 20, 8183, 8192-8193, 8194, 88183; see also, Appellant's Opening Brief at 16). Riparian and pre-1914 appropriative water rights are vested property rights that cannot be taken without due process and just compensation. (See, United States v. State Water Resources Control Board (1986) 182 Cal.App.3d 82, 100 ["It is equally axiomatic that once rights to use water are acquired, they become vested property rights. As such, they cannot be infringed by others or taken by government action without due process and just compensation."]; see also, Casitas Municipal Water District v. United States (Fed. Cir. 2013) 708 F.3d 1340, 1353-1354; Ivanhoe Irr. Dist. v. All Parties (1957) 47 Cal.2d 597, 623.) Because water rights are vested property rights, the State Board has traditionally utilized adjudicative processes to issue or modify such rights. (See, e.g., Bank of America, N.A. v. State Water Resources Control Board (1974) 42 Cal.App.3d 198; see also Abatti v. Imperial Irr. Dist. (2020) 52 Cal.App.5th 236, 2020 WL 4013439 at *12 ["The farmers are beneficial owners of the District's water rights . . . and that right is constitutionally protected."].)

The State Board admittedly styled its emergency regulations and related enforcement actions as quasi-legislative to avoid compliance with "cumbersome" constitutional due process requirements. (AR008253 p. 27:11-28:6; 008255 p. 33:10-14; 008265 p. 74:11-14; 007815; 008249 p. 11:25-12:3.) An agency acts in a legislative capacity when it formulates a rule to be applied in future cases and in an adjudicative capacity when it applies such a rule to a specific set of facts. (Patterson v. Central Coast Regional. Com. (1976) 58 Cal.App.3d 833, 840.) But the line between judicial and legislative decision-making is not always clear. Consequently, California courts have

traditionally applied a comprehensive functional analysis in determining whether an action is quasi-judicial or quasi-legislative in nature. (*Wilson v. Hidden Val. Mun. Water Dist.* (1967) 256 Cal.App.2d 271, 280.) In undertaking such a comprehensive functional analysis, courts have traditionally considered a variety of factors, including:

- Whether the agency is determining a question of right or obligation, or of property;
- Whether the agency's action determines individual rights, or involves the exercise of a discretion governed by considerations of the public welfare;
- Whether the agency's action resolves the rights and interests of individuals or resolves fundamentally political questions; and
- Whether the agency's determination is informed by how it will affect a large community.

(Id.; California School Boards Assn. v. State Bd. of Education (2015) 240 Cal. App. 4th 838, 847.)

Here, the Court of Appeal declined to undertake the comprehensive functional analysis required by law. Instead, the Court of Appeal merely stated, in conclusory fashion, that it had "no difficulty concluding the regulations formulated a rule to be applied to future cases, and were therefore legislative in nature." (Op. at 20.)

Had the Court of Appeal undertaken the required comprehensive functional analysis, it would have been forced to grapple with a number of critical facts that render the State Board's actions in this instance quasi-judicial in nature. First, the number of persons directly affected by the subject emergency regulations is extremely small. (See Petition at 39 [regulations applied to only seventeen Deer Creek water right holders].) Second, because water rights are a species of real property, the emergency regulations indisputably determine a question of property rights—in this case, whether Stanford Vina's continued exercise of its senior water rights was unreasonable. Third, the State Board adopted the emergency regulations based in part on its authority under the public trust doctrine, which requires the State Board to balance the interests of the public with Stanford Vina's specific private interests – which it clearly did not do. (See Natl. Audubon Soc. v. Superior Court (1983) 33 Cal.3d 419, 445 [describing duty to protect public trust "whenever feasible"].)

The State Board also adopted the emergency regulations based on Article X, Section 2 of the California Constitution. This Court has repeatedly emphasized that the determination of what constitutes an unreasonable use of water is a factual determination that must account for competing uses and assess alternatives in the context of Article X, Section 2's mandate that water "be put to beneficial use to the fullest extent" possible. (See e.g., Joslin v. Marin Mun. Water Dist. (1967) 67 Cal. 2d 132, 139.) These factual determinations and the balancing required under Joslin and its progeny are nowhere to be found in the Opinion. Indeed, none of the relevant factors present here—the small number of parties directly affected by the regulations, their application to a form of real property, and the requirement that the State Board balance competing trust uses and make specific factual findings in exercising its authority under the public trust doctrine and Article X, Section 2—supported the Court of Appeal's holding that the State Board's action was legislative in nature.

C. The Court of Appeal Misapplied the First Appellate District's Decision in Light v. State Water Resources Control Board.

The Court of Appeal relied on the First District Court of Appeal's decision in Light v. State Water Resources Control Board (2014) 226 Cal. App. 4th 1463 to support its determination that the State Board regulations were legislative in nature. But Light did not obviate the obligation of a court to undertake the comprehensive functional analysis described above. Importantly, and unlike in this case, the State Board regulation in Light did not limit any individual diversions of water; it simply established a regulatory process under which such limitations might be imposed in the future following additional regulatory decision-making. In fact, the regulation in Light delegated the task of determining what diversion limitations needed to be imposed to comply with the regulation to local bodies composed of individual diverters themselves. (Light, supra, 226 Cal.App.4th at 1472.) In other words, the court in Light did not address a circumstance where limitations on diversions were imposed as an immediate response to the State Board's regulation. Instead, the State Board "established a schedule allowing for the collection and analysis of baseline data during the first two and a half years following adoption" of the regulation. (Id. at 1476.) These provisions led the Light court to conclude that the plaintiffs' fears that implementation of the regulation would result in violations of the rule of priority were "premature" until specific limitations on diversions were imposed under locally developed water demand management programs. (Id. at 1490.)

The regulation at issue in *Light* is distinguishable from the regulations at issue here. The trial court specifically found that adoption of the subject regulation and the curtailment of Stanford Vina's water rights was part of a single, integrated and consolidated regulatory action. (AR 1729; 1730; 1738; 1739; 1740.) Whereas *Light* involved a facial challenge to a two-step regulatory process before limitations on diversions could be imposed, in this case the legislative determination and the curtailment of diversions occurred essentially simultaneously and were part of a single consolidated action.

D. The Opinion Has Broad and Troubling Implications for the Administration of Water Rights in California Generally and Due Process Protections Specifically.

Failing to undertake the comprehensive functional analysis required by California law, the Court of Appeal erroneously held that Stanford Vina was not entitled to an evidentiary hearing before its exercise of its water rights was halted. Amici are concerned that, if the Opinion stands, the State Board will utilize the Opinion to continue to chip away at due process protections available in water right proceedings generally, beyond the narrow context of emergency regulations.

While there is no constitutionally protected right to an unreasonable use of water, the right holder is entitled to the due process protection of an evidentiary hearing to determine whether its use is, in fact, unreasonable. Any other rule would empower the State Board to avoid the due process requirements of the federal and state constitutions by, in essence, defining a water right out of existence. As the Ninth Circuit has observed, "a state cannot validly effect a taking of property by the simple expedient of holding that the property right never existed." (*Cherry v. Steiner* (9th Cir. 1983) 716 F.2d 687, 692 [ultimately holding that the Arizona Supreme Court's decision in *Town of Chino Valley v. City of Prescott* (Ariz. 1981) 131 Ariz. 78 did not constitute a "startling and unpredictable change in Arizona property law, if it represent[ed] any change at all." (internal

quotation marks omitted)].) In light of the fact that Stanford Vina's water use had been occurring—and presumably considered reasonable—for more than a century, the State Board's decision here constitutes exactly the type of "startling and unpredictable change" in property law that the state and federal constitutions forbid.

An emergency is not an excuse to dispense with a water right holder's federal and state due process rights. Nor is it lawful for an agency to use the guise of emergency regulations to effectively take individual property rights. Here, the evidence shows the State Water Board did not want to do the "cumbersome" but necessary work to allow for due process, and chose rather to abuse its emergency rulemaking authority to avoid procedural due process. While recurring droughts are a fact of life in California, they do not occur overnight. The State Board had almost one full year to convene an evidentiary hearing before curtailing Stanford Vina's diversions again in 2015. The State Board regularly conducts evidentiary hearings of this type, and Stanford Vina's request for even a limited evidentiary hearing was denied (AR 8282, pg. 143:11-16; 9396-9397 ¶ 2-3; 9399 ¶ 2; 9/23/2014 Transcript, Pg. 16-18; 3/17/2015 Transcript Pg. 20:2-11, Pg. 69:23-70:3).

The Court of Appeal's endorsement of the State Board's use of emergency regulations to circumvent due process requirements in water right proceedings has grave implications for Amici and their members and water users throughout the state. If allowed to stand, the Opinion will be used by the State Board to strip water right holders of due process protections and make future declarations of "per se" unreasonable water use under the guise of quasi-legislative actions. The Opinion provides a disincentive for the State Board to prepare in advance for future droughts because it incorrectly holds they may effectively invalidate water rights without due process.

E. Review Is Necessary to Avoid Frustrating Public Policy Regarding the Consideration of the Relative Priority of Water Rights that May Be Subject to Regulation.

In adopting the emergency regulations and curtailment orders, the State Board failed to analyze whether curtailment of water rights junior to Stanford Vina's rights could have achieved the emergency regulations' minimum flow objectives, and instead simply issued blanket curtailment orders. The Opinion compounds this error by simply stating that the State Board implemented its unreasonableness determination by "curtailing all diversions that threatened to violate" the minimum flow requirements. (Op. at 35.) Without any analysis of whether curtailment of more junior rights could have allowed Stanford Vina to exercise its asserted senior rights, the Court of Appeal's conclusion that the State Board did not violate the rule of priority is unfounded, and is inconsistent with legislative direction that is directly on point. The use of the words "threatened to violate" is also troublesome, as, without a due process hearing, there was no evidence that continued use of the water right would actually have an adverse impact on the fishery.

By amending Water Code section 1058.5, the Legislature intended that curtailment regulations would "follow established California water right laws concerning priority." (See 2013 California Senate Bill No. 104, California 2013-2014 Regular Session, California Committee Report (Feb. 27, 2014).) Both the State Board's actions and the Opinion undermine the Legislature's intent by frustrating the public policy that requires the State Board to consider the relative priority of water rights that may be subject to curtailment. As the Third District Court of Appeal, the same court that issued the Opinion, previously emphasized, the State Board has an affirmative obligation to

make "[every] effort . . . to respect and enforce the rule of priority." (El Dorado Irr. Dist. v. State Water Resources Control Board (2006) 142 Cal.App.4th 937, 966, emphasis added [striking down a State Board action to impose a term in a senior appropriator's water right permit when the State Board had failed to impose a similar term in the permits and licenses of more junior appropriators with later priority dates].) For this additional reason, review should be granted to ensure that future courts effectuate the Legislature's intent regarding priority of water rights.

IV. Conclusion

Amici respectfully request that this Court grant Stanford Vina's Petition for Review.

August 2020 Stanislaus River Update

Water Year Type

San Joaquin Basin "60-20-20" water year type (based on the May 75% exceedance forecast): **Dry**

Flows




Figure 1. Goodwin (daily) releases to the Stanislaus River since January 1, 2020. Data from GDW station on CDEC.

After the spring pulse flow, through the summer until the fall pulse flow begins, the Dry year type SRP flow schedule requires minimum instream base flows of 200 cfs. Goodwin releases since January 2020 are shown in Figure 1.

Water Temperature




Figure 2. Daily water temperatures on the Stanislaus River upstream of Knights Ferry since March 1, 2020. Data from USGS gage 11302000 on NWIS; temperature threshold reference lines added by SWT.

The temperature thresholds included in Figures 2-9, below, are the thresholds used in the 2019 NMFS LTO BiOp¹ (see Incidental Take Statement on p. 807) to define the extent of take anticipated from water temperature effects in the Stanislaus River. It is important to note that many of the temperature figures provide subdaily information or information at locations other than Orange Blossom Bridge and thus don't reflect the specific metrics for take in the 2019 NMFS LTO BiOp. Temperature thresholds have been added to these figures at the request of Stanislaus Watershed Team members to provide a general reference of water temperature suitability.




Figure 3. Stanislaus (hourly) water temperatures at Orange Blossom Bridge since March 1, 2020. Data from OBB station on CDEC; temperature threshold reference lines added by SWT.




Figure 4. Stanislaus (15-minute) water temperatures at Ripon since March 1, 2020. Data from RIP station on CDEC; temperature threshold reference lines added by SWT.




Figure 5. San Joaquin River (15-minute) water temperatures at Vernalis since March 1, 2020, Data from VNS station on CDEC; temperature threshold reference line added by SWT. Note that, unlike in the previous figures, temperature is reported in degrees Celsius. 10°C=50°F; 12°C=53.6°F; 14°C=57.2°F; 16°C=60.8°F; 18°C=64.4°F; 20°C=68.0°F; 22°C=71.6°F; 24°C=75.2°F; 26°C=78.8°F; 28°C=82.4°F; 30°C=86.0°F.




Figure 6. Stanislaus River water temperatures at Orange Blossom Bridge for March through September from 2001 to present. Data from SacPAS; temperature threshold reference lines added by SWT. http://www.cbr.washington.edu/sacramento/data/query_river_allyears.html




Figure 7. Stanislaus River water temperatures at Ripon for March through September from 1999 to present. Data from SacPAS; temperature threshold reference lines added by SWT. http://www.cbr.washington.edu/sacramento/data/query_river_allyears.html




Figure 8. San Joaquin River water temperatures at Vernalis for March through September from 2015 to present. Data from SacPAS; temperature threshold reference line added by SWT. http://www.cbr.washington.edu/sacramento/data/query_river_allyears.html




Figure 9. 2020 Stanislaus River flow and water temperatures from January 1, 2020 to present. Data (including temperature threshold reference lines) from SacPAS: http://www.cbr.washington.edu/sacramento/data/tc_stanislaus.html#nmfs2019

Water temperatures in the Stanislaus River since March 2020 are shown below at Goodwin Canyon (Figure 2), Orange Blossom Bridge (Figure 3), and at Ripon (Figure 4). Water temperatures in the San Joaquin River since March 2020 are shown below at Vernalis (Figure 5). Current-year water temperatures are plotted along with historical temperatures for Orange Blossom Bridge (Figure 6), Ripon (Figure 7), and Vernalis (Figure 8). A compilation of Stanislaus River water temperatures and Goodwin releases is provided in Figure 9.

Update on Fish Monitoring

No updates since last month. Monitoring for juvenile salmonid outmigration using rotary screw traps has ended for the year, and monitoring for adult salmonid migration into the river (using a weir) and spawning (via carcass surveys) has not yet started.

DATA SHARING

- High level feedback:
 - Please share data requested prior to meeting (even a summary set of request categories would be helpful)
 - Not clear on ask. FishBIO coordination with fisheries agencies on Stanislaus includes data sharing but FishBIO hasn't been part of the dialogue that initiated this data sharing topic
 - Reporting on studies is not always publicly available, therefore identifying broad categories of data in request (rather than naming specific studies which may involve the same or similar methodology)
 - Interested in knowing what data the Irrigation Districts are collecting and what they are willing to share.
- Specific data requests:
 - Rotary Screw Trapping- In order to be most meaningful the data should include both release and recapture data for efficiency releases, trap data (eg revolutions, debris), and associated water quality
 - Seine Surveys- In order to be the most meaningful the data should include area seined, length and species of all catch, life-stage of salmonids, and associated water quality data
 - Electrofishing Surveys- In order to be the most meaningful the data should include information about the electrofisher settings, and time surveyed, length of species of all catch (including fish not taken onto the boat, if available), and associated water quality data
 - Snorkel Surveys-In order to be the most meaningful the data should include information about survey area, fish data (including length, if available), turbidity, and associated water quality data
 - Redd Surveys-In order to be the most meaningful the data should include information about survey methodology, location of redd (by riffle name, number or GPS coordinates), and size of redd (if available)
 - Weir Data- In order to be the most meaningful the data should include information about daily fish
 passage (both downstream and upstream), sex ratios (if available), and stacking data
 - PIT Tag Data-n order to be the most meaningful the data should include information about location of detection, PIT tag number, as well as the information necessary to identity the species and initial tagging data
 - Diet Contents-In order to be the most meaningful the data should include information to match diet contents with source fish, and identification to the lowest taxonomic group possible as well as certainty (if available)
 - Restoration Monitoring- In order to be the most meaningful the data should include site information, monitoring methods, results, and associated water quality data
 - Water Quality Monitoring (temperature, Dissolved Oxygen, etc) In order to be the most meaningful the data should include site information, and results including any revisions from QA/QC protocols
 - Daily catch at the lower Stanislaus R. RST located at Caswell It is operated by Pacific States
 Marine Fish Commission. The contact is Eric Bradbury (EBradbury@psmfc.org). Working on an
 adaptive management plan for the South Delta Temporary Barriers, have not had any luck reaching
 out directly to PSMFC for the data.

- O Distribution and abundance of juvenile and adult O. mykiss in the Stanislaus River with details on survey timing so can be linked to environmental covariates (likely source is FISHBIO, possible data from earlier years from Cramer Fish Sciences)
- Temperature modeling runs for alternative flow shaping of the fall and spring pulse flows This
 would provide a more quantitative water temperature information input into our considerations
 for flow shaping. Currently, we just look at current water temperatures and qualitatively project
 future water temps based on typical seasonal temperature trends (likely source is modeling
 support from Reclamation, the Districts, or district consultants)

ANNUAL REPORT: LESSONS LEARNED

- Better communication on the timing of spawning and egg incubation through fry emergence and communication and coordination on management of flows, including flood control releases, to avoid redd dewatering and redd scouring impacts
- Pulse Shaping Considerations: This year might be a good opportunity to include our lists of various
 considerations for the fall and spring pulse flows to capture the lessons learned over the past 10+ years
 and serve as a reference for the SWT going forward. (Barb has draft lists prepared when there was
 discussion about including them in the SRP guidance document; we could add the Tulloch ops
 considerations discussed at the July SWT meeting.)
- Flow Schedule Accounting: One of the lessons learned by SOG was that the minimum flow schedule accounting gets a little complicated when the year-type changes during the spring pulse flow period. My understanding is that Reclamation intends for SWT to continue to use the water accounting method used WY 2018 onward by SOG. I recommend that we memorialize the use of this water accounting method for implementation of the SRP flows. (Barb has a draft summary of this accounting method prepared when there was discussion about including them in the SRP guidance document)
- Optimal flow shaping is an iterative process and it may be impossible to meet the needs of all concerned parties.
